#### **BINGHAM AWARD**

Professor William W. Graessley, Department of Chemical Engineering and Department of Materials Science and Engineering, Northwestern University, has been named the 1979 Bingham Medalist of the Society of Rheology.

Professor Graessley was born in Muskegon, Michigan in 1933. He received undergraduate degrees in chemistry and chemical engineering at the University of Michigan and his Ph.D. in chemical engineering from the same institution in 1960. After spending four years at Air Reduction Company he joined the faculty at Northwestern University.

Professor Graessley's research activities are concerned with the structural aspects of polymer rheology, polymerization reactor kinetics, and molecular characterization. He has made important contributions, both theoretical and experimental, towards an understanding of how molecular structure and intermolecular interactions influence the properties of polymer liquids and networks.

# VIIIth INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS ON RHEOLOGY

The VIIIth International Congress on Rheology will be held during the week of September 1-6, 1980, in the School of Engineering of the University of Naples. The school is situated just out-of-town within easy reach by subway.

The opening session will be held in the Aula Magna of the school on the morning of September 1, 1980. After the usual speeches by varying dignitaries the opening address will be given by C. Truesdell who will speak on: The History of Rheology. The regular sessions will be arranged in five parallel sessions.

Proceedings will be made available at the time of registration. The format of the proceedings will be similar to that of the VIIth Congress in that it will contain extended abstracts except for invited lectures which will be published *in toto*. The cost of the Proceedings will be included in the registration fee.

The registration fee has not been set yet, but will be of the order of \$100 for pre-registrants and \$130-\$150 for late registrants.

Housing will be in hotels in town, close to adequate transportation. A banquet and a ladies' program are planned as well as various excursions to places like Pompeii, Capri, Amalfi, Sorrento, the Vesuvio, etc. These will be handled by an independent travel agency who will also make suggestions for pre- and/or post-congress excursions.

The nearest international airport for wide-bodied aircraft is Rome's Fiumicino Airport. Excellent train transportation from Rome and Naples is available. Buses run from Fiumicino airport to the train station (Termini) in Rome. Flights from Rome to Naples should be booked well in advance.

In keeping with tradition, the President of the International Committee on Rheology, Josef Kubat, Chalmers University, Gothenberg, Sweden, will be the Honorary Chairman.

### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION

A short course on Instrumental Methods in Rheology is planned for the Boston Meeting. It will concentrate on polymer melts although a question period will allow people to ask about other areas too. The objective will be to outline the type of measurements that can be made, how the data are obtained, and what information about molecular or processing variables can be learned. The course will be coordinated with the instrument exhibit.

Since the exhibitors cannot start to setup before Sunday, a handson course is not possible; however, an effort will be made to open the exhibit late Sunday afternoon for course members (particularly those who will not be staying for the regular meeting). The Local Arrangements Committee has contacted the Hotel about rooms and a lecture hall for the weekend before the meeting.

The first returns from the short course survey have been received. Although the number of responses is small, they are clearly from people interested in attending future short courses so the results will provide some useful information.

## MINUTES OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING

#### Cleveland, Ohio March 3, 1979

The spring meeting of the Executive Committee of The Society of Rheology was called to order by President Krieger at 10:30 am in the Sheraton Hopkins Airport Hotel, Cleveland, OH. Present were Executive Committee members E. B. Bagley, E. A. Collins, I. M. Krieger, A. B. Metzner, R. R. Myers, W. R. Schowalter, and M. T. Shaw. In addition, D. Hunston, N. Nakajima, R. S. Porter, C. L. Sieglaff, and E. J. Tolle attended.

The Secretary read the minutes of the October 22, 1978, Executive Committee Meeting; these were approved as read.

The Editor provided a report on the Journal of Rheology and the Bulletin, and requested a decision on a policy for advertisements in the Journal. By motion, second and voice vote, the Editor was authorized to allow John Wiley and Sons to include inserts in the Journal at the Editor's convenience and discretion. A membership application blank may also be included.

The invitation to The Society to be listed as a sponsor of *Rheological Acta* was reviewed by Metzner; a motion to remain unlisted was passed after considerable discussion. Dr. Metzner will communicate the decision to Dr. Giesekus, Editor of *Rheological Acta*.

The Treasurer reported a balance at the end of 1978 of \$28,984, up by about \$5,000 from 1977. A sum of \$100 to reimburse the President's institution for out-of-pocket expenses was approved; a yearly discretionary fund of \$500 maximum for the use of the President, to be disbursed by the treasurer, and with an accounting available for the Executive Committee was also approved. A short discussion of the possibility of reimbursing Executive Committee members for travel expenses to committee meetings led to the conclusion that The Society could not afford this luxury, but that the President could, when needed, use his discretionary fund for this purpose.

A telephone report from J. R. Knox concerning the organization of the 50th Anniversary Meeting was transmitted by Krieger. About \$8000 has been raised from industry to support the program; several federal agencies have also been contacted for additional funds. Notification of the meeting is being circulated broadly, both here and abroad. Partial support for travel has been offered to presidents of foreign societies, and a luncheon in honor of Bingham medalists and past presidents has been arranged. Mementos have been selected.

Tolle reported for the local arrangements committee, noting a full schedule of activities including an extensive instrument exhibit, a short course, a reception at the Gardiner Museum, an organ recital, and the traditional Tuesday evening banquet. Prof. H. Markovitz will be invited to speak on the history of The Society.

The technical program was reviewed by Porter, who reported that 15 topical sessions had been arranged. About a dozen Bingham medalists have agreed to participate, and it was the opinion of the Committee that their talks should be placed in the sessions according to subject. Porter was authorized to expand his committee; the necessary appointments to be made by Krieger. Hunston reported that the short course at the 50th Anniversary Meeting will be entitled "Instrumental Methods in Rheology" with C. Macosko and R. Armstrong appointed as instructors. (Collins interjected at this point that his survey on short courses showed that "Rheology of Solids and Composites" was extremely popular and perhaps worth repeating.)

For funding the technical program, the Committee passed two motions: (1) that at least 51% of the specially collected funds, with a minimum of \$6,000, be set aside for the use of the Program

Chairman; and (2) that the specially collected funds be in control of and disbursed by the treasurer. These funds do not include the small amount normally allocated to the Local Arrangements Committee to pay bills, but those specifically collected from industry and government for support of the program of the 50th Anniversary Meeting.

N. Nakajima reported on arrangements for the spring meeting in Hawaii. Most have been finalized, with a fine technical program (arranged by D. C. Bogue) in store.

Reports from other standing committees followed, including the Bingham Award Committee (May 11, 1979 has been set as the deadline); the Nomination Committee (has met and will report to the Secretary by May 1, 1979); the Membership Committee (membership has increased to 925, new brochures have been mailed with 8 responses so far); and the Site Selection Committee (aside from previously discussed sites, a formal invitation has been received from G. Miller for the Louisville area).

With no new business presented, the meeting was adjourned by Krieger at 4:00 pm. The next Executive Committee Meeting will be held on Sunday, October 28 at 2:00 pm in the Copley Plaza Hotel, Boston.

# EDITOR'S REPORT THE SOCIETY OF RHEOLOGY

#### Publication Status, Journal of Rheology

The Journal of Rheology Volume 22 contained 29 papers, 3 notes and, counting the abstracts from the Journal of Rheology, Japan, and abstracts from the 46th and 47th Society of Rheology annual meetings, 682 pages in the six issues.

A total of 62 manuscripts were submitted in 1978. Assistant Editors Edward Collins, Shigeharu Onogi, George Savins, Charles Sieglaff, Alex Silberberg and James White were instrumental in securing competent referees for these manuscripts with acceptance running about 58% for the past year. Irvin Krieger was responsible for a suspension rheology symposium.

Certificates of appreciation were distributed to the Assistant Editors.

The golden anniversary volume of the Journal of Rheology will be gold-covered. We have 26 manuscripts in process for this volume, which carries Wiley past Issue No. 4.

Bulletins were issued in April, August and December, 1978. In addition to giving details of coming Society meetings and Society officer reports, the December issue contained a survey of topics for short courses given by the Society.

#### Relations with Wiley

Our publisher does not view favorably our consideration of sponsoring Rheol Acta, even if it is in name only. I believe we should honor his feelings in this matter.

There will be a dinner for Assistant Editors and Society Officers at Kona hosted by Mr. Allan Wittman. This will be a working dinner, at which an accumulation of suggestions from various sources will be discussed. Included will be consideration of a standard referee form to be used by the Assistant Editors.
