MOTION PICTURES ON RHEOLOGICAL TOPICS

The National Committee on Fluid Mechanics has issued a series of films based on experimental demonstrations. Two classes of films are in production, half-hour motion pictures with sound on various concepts and themes in fluid mechanics, and four-minute cartridge loops to demonstrate a specific point. The loops require a special projector.

Available on purchase or free loan are films on surface tension, flow visualization, deformation of continuous media, pressure fields and fluid acceleration, vorticity, and drag. In production are rheological behavior of fluids, boundary layer control, magnetohydrodynamics, gas dynamics, and Eulerian vs Lagrangian frames. BRITISH SOCIETY OF RHEOLOGY ACTIVITIES

On September 28-30, 1964 the University of Exeter will host a meeting of our sister society in Britain on rheometry, and on the teaching of rheology. Twelve papers have been promised (about the

same score as our own meeting), one of which has the eye-catching title of "Finite Strain without Tensors, or Rheology without Tears."

At the conference a new and active committee of the British Society (called the Exploratory Committee on Rheological Research) will make a preliminary report on its deliberations on how rheological research is conducted in British universities. A movement is afoot to centralize rheological research in the United Kingdom, and the activities of this committee apparently constitute the initial phase of the movement. We will keep in touch with these developments, and also will inform you from time to time of other activities which we may be overlooking yet which constitute a proper function for a society. The British Society, for example, publishes RHEOLOGY ABSTRACTS on a regular basis. In fact, they have two editors: one for the abstracts and another for the Bulletin, which your editor admits gives a better impression of a big happy family than do his meager efforts.
